1. Was this training beneficial or instructive for you?

- I would like to utilize the knowledge of response system to radiation-exposure and the effects of radiation exposure, linking these knowledge to the radiation emergency response system and actual response in Korea, so that we can effectively respond to the situation.
- As a staff member of ER and Radiation emergency care personnel, I am going to provide an opportunity in which I can share the importance of the equipment, medicines, and own roles with colleagues who are involved.
